Our youngest learners in Nursery have been busy enhancing their gross motor skills through engaging movement games during their PE lesson this week. These fun and interactive activities not only support

their physical development but also teach them important lessons about safety, all in a playful and safe environment.



In Reception, our pupils have been learning about how schools around the world are different. They explored everything from classrooms to uniforms and the work pupils do in other countries. A special highlight was a Zoom session with other schools in our Trust, where the pupils got to ask questions and compare their experiences. In Personal Development, they created their own schools, and in Art, they designed imaginative new uniforms—sparking plenty of creativity as you can see in the picture here.



Year 1 had a fantastic time participating in a Black History Month workshop this week. They learned all about the Windrush generation and the rich culture of Jamaica. Pupils loved dancing to Caribbean music and hearing personal stories from individuals who lived during that time. It was an enriching experience, and one that left a lasting impression on them.

In 1B, pupils have started working on their ball-handling skills in PE. This is a crucial step in developing their coordination and control, and it will prepare them for more advanced activities, including small-sided games, in the coming weeks. The focus is on building a solid foundation for future sports skills.

In Year 2, our pupils had an exciting trip to the Natural History Museum where they attended the ocean wildlife show. Our young explorers became expert researchers, learning about different ocean species and discovering interesting facts about the Sperm whale and its prey, the Giant Squid. The trip brought a new level of

excitement to their science lessons, where they have been eager to apply their newfound knowledge.

Year 3 also took part in a Black History workshop this week, celebrating the contributions of prominent Black figures throughout history. The workshop was a wonderful opportunity for pupils to engage with important cultural history and to broaden their understanding of the world.

Meanwhile, Year 4B have been busy writing biographies of influential women, from Harriet Tubman and Dr. Mae Jemison to Greta Thunberg. The pupils were fascinated to learn that Dr. Mae Jemison was the first African American woman to travel to outer space, and they were inspired by Greta Thunberg's global environmental activism. These biographies sparked meaningful discussions about leadership and change.



After spending time on teamwork and communication exercises during their PE lessons, our Year 4 pupils have now moved on to orienteering and map-reading tasks. These activities have been a great opportunity for them to apply their teamwork skills in a practical setting, navigating through fun challenges while improving their map-reading abilities.



In Year 5, pupils had an awesome day with our Resident Artist. Miss Hatcher, which was dedicated to exploring the surrealist work of Salvador Dali. After testing out compositions in their sketchbooks, they created their



dream-inspired masterpieces. The day was filled with imagination and creativity, and the headteacher was thrilled to see such fantastic artwork from the pupils.



Last week, pupils in 3B had the opportunity to work with Miss Hatcher. The have been developing their drawing and mark-making skills using artist-grade pencils to explore shadow and light. They practiced curves and layering to create form, and throughout the day, challenged themselves by using a wider range of materials such as oil pastels and fine markers. A key part of the session





was discussing the colour wheel, where the children were surprised to learn that opposite colours can be used to make a colour darker. They eagerly

experimented with this technique before creating their own observational colour drawings.



The final part of the day saw the pupils create abstract drawings inspired by the work of Yayoi Kusama, and they were thrilled to discover that her artwork is currently on display in London—an exciting opportunity for them to see her work in person.
